TRAINS WRECK, SET HILLIARDS FIRE

4 Injured as Army 20-mm. Shells Explode



Farm Bureau Grain Elevator Wrecked; Hundreds on Duty

Fifty freight cars of two Pennsylvania Railroad trains were piled up in Hilliards last night, in a wreck that set off a terrific gasoline or naphtha explosion and badly damaged a large Farm Bureau grain elevator.

Many of the wrecked cars were set afire. One of them was loaded with Army ammunition and shells exploded almost continuously for more than three hours impeding the work of 150 firemen called to fight the blaze.

At least four men were injured by shell fragments. Alvin E. DeLong, 77, of 2030 N. Cassady Ave., a Franklin Township emergency ward member, was taken to Chillicothe Hospital with an injury above his left eye from a shell casing fragment.

Charles R. Scott, chief of the fire protection bureau in the State Fire Marshal's Office, suffered a hand injury and received first aid, Ralph Stamm, 1975 Peters Ave., suffered a chest bruise when a casing pierced his leather jacket. He also received first aid. An unidentified man was struck in the back by a casing, but it was not learned where he was treated.

One official estimated the damage to a mixture of some ten city water tanks at \$200,000, although the fire was not confined to the tanks alone.

The pile-up was in the southern part of Hilliards, within a short distance of the railroad crossing.

Along the east side of the tracks, according to railroad officials, a passenger car was loaded with 200 million shells burst for the Army. It was said that the shells were set off by a train.

An official of the Franklin Township fire department said that a fire in the grain elevator was not a serious one, but that it was not known whether it was a fire in the elevator or in the grain.

C. J. McManis, treasurer of Hilliards, said that the Hilliards Community Association and the Hilliards Fire Department were on duty.

Propose Passenger Car Pay \$2.90 Turnpike Toll

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11-Cent Theft May Bring Life Term

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A man arrested for allegedly picking a Philadelphia policeman's pocket of 11 cents in Times Square on New Year's Eve may get a life sentence as a fourth offender.

Meier Lewis, a 33-year-old white, pleaded for time to get a lawyer at his arraignment today, pointing to three previous convictions for larceny, under state law, a person convicted of a fourth felony faces a possible 15-year-to-life imprisonment sentence. His hearing was adjourned until Monday.

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REVENUE BUREAU GETS OVERHAUL BY TRUMAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—President Truman directed a far-reaching overhaul of the ailing Internal Revenue Bureau today as a Commissioner.

The president's order, which was signed by the vice president, directed the bureau to be reorganized and to be placed under the control of the Treasury Department.
